Access to Sanitation Services



Ghana sanitation needs are vast

25% access to basic sanitation


47% using shared facilities

18% practicing open defecation

Government has set objectives to scale-up safely managed services


At least 24 million additional people will need to access at least basic sanitation services, for universal access by 2030 - 3 Million people per year

Estimated Number of Toilets Required for Universal Access by 2030



Every year, up to 2030, between 370,000 and 500,000 new toilet facilities should be constructed


Investment requirements - minimum costs in US\$



Achieving Ghana's sanitation objectives requires, at the minimum, US\$ 3.5 billion in capital investments alone up to 2030

Strategy for Household Sanitation

Examples


- Implementing projects with World Bank support to develop sanitation infrastructure (including treatment services)
 - ✓ Provision of subsidies for the poorest (up to 70% of toilet costs)
 - ✓ Communication and market building
- Working with UNICEF on Innovative Approaches to mobilise resources from the private sector and households
 - ✓ Working to generate demand and household own investments and build markets
 - ✓ Piloting the Revolving Fund Schemes to Provide Credit Facility to HHs and SMEs


B2. Household Investment in Water paid to private business /vendors households in Ghana:

- 37% HHs use sachet for drinking (2.2 M HH) @ 10 sachet /HH @ 0.12 GHS/sachet = \$98M
- Estimated 15% households pay to private vendors /Kiosk for water (@3 Jar a day water (1 GHS/day) = \$ 46 M


In Ghana, the poor pay much higher price for water and sanitation services compared to their richer counterparts HH with water connection = 5.5 GHS/1,000 Liters (0.55 P/Liter)

Collection at Kiosk; 40 - 50 Pesewas for 25 Liter (2 P/ liter)

The Innovative Financing Roadmap of the WASH Sector in Ghana



Key Partners / Donor Commitments

- \$1M to de-risking the first loss, confirmed by Impact for Children Fund
- A Joint Proposal of UN Agencies on GSF approved and kept in pipeline for funding (top 7, selected among 159 proposal from over 100 countries)
- Endorsement of key ministries (MSWR, MLG, MoF, etc.)
