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#### Bibliography on Participation and Participatory Methods in Development Work and Research

#### Introduction to the bibliography

Participatory approaches to development provide mechanisms for local stakeholders to influence and share control of development initiatives, decisions, and resources (World Bank Operations Evaluation Department, OED, 2001).

This bibliography on participatory approaches and participation in development work has been prepared in 2002 in connection with work on the 2<sup>nd</sup> edition of the book: Britha Mikkelsen "Methods for Development Work and Research – A Guide for Practitioners", first published by Sage Publications, New Delhi, in 1995. The focus of the bibliography was also inspired by Maria Dyhr Andreassen's recent experience from working with participatory methods in an agricultural project in Malawi.

The bibliography is selective. No attempt has been made to exhaust this huge subject area of participatory methods. The objective is to present a selection of new literature on participatory field study methods in development work and research. Practical applications of participatory methods as well as critical analysis of uses and abuses are included.

The bibliography is divided into three parts. Part 1 presents a selection of publications on participatory approaches that are primarily found in essential periodicals and books. Part 2 presents literature accessible on the Internet. Part 3 lists websites of organisations, institutes etc. where relevant literature and publications can be found and in most cases be downloaded.

The following criteria were used for the inclusion of the around 120 titles and 15 websites:

- Publications that illustrate experience with participatory methods, e.g. specific examples, case-studies or real life situations rather than publications which discuss theoretical issues mainly.
- Participatory methods are increasingly applied not only at community level but also at sector and policy levels in development work. Hence, literature on macro, meso and micro level is included in the bibliography.
- Recent publications. Publication year is primarily from 2000 to the end of 2002. A few exceptions are made to key publications from before 2000.
- The bibliography is meant to give a broad picture of the publications and literature available within the area of participation and participatory approaches. This means that publications dealing with the same issues are reduced to a few examples in order to present a larger variety of issues.
- Two types of international organisations and institutes are listed in part 3. A) The organisations that present specific Internet sites about participatory resource areas and B) organisations, which do not have a particular link to a participation site but nevertheless hold a significant number of publications and documents about participation. Eldis is a central site because of its large information database on development issues.
- A small selection of data analysis software for qualitative data is also included.

The titles are listed alphabetically according to author (or organisation if author is not specified). Keywords are highlighted within the summary text. References in part 2 include the direct links to the documents. Be aware that these links are sometimes closed and new ones are formed. The dates in brackets following each reference link indicate when the link was accessible. If the links are closed, we recommend using the search function on the specific website.

An index of keywords has been included to assist your search and to give a fast overview of the contents of the bibliography. The numbers in the index refer to page numbers.

The bibliography is intended as a guide to the most recent publications, literature and websites in the field of participation and participatory methods. It will hopefully prove useful to students, researchers and practitioners interested in development work. Additionally, it can provide more experienced people with new inputs to where interesting literature on participatory methods can be found.

We welcome any comments and/or additional inputs to the bibliography for the preparation of future editions.

The bibliography has been prepared by Maria Dyhr Andreassen, M.Sc.in Agriculture/Land Use in Developing Countries, with support from Britha Mikkelsen, PhD Environment, Technology and Social Studies, in collaboration between Cowi and IIS (Institute for International Studies, former Centre for Development Research, CDR, Copenhagen).
